Stim Bullitt: A Champion of Vibrant Communities

Lifelong Seattle resident, outdoorsman, and Downtown Seattle visionary, Stim Bullitt, passed away in April, leaving a void in our city's civic landscape. Shortly after his passing, we were deeply honored to learn that Seattle Parks Foundation had been named as one of two beneficiary organizations in Stim's will. In this document Stim wrote about how he wished he could have given more to the city he loved and that he hoped this gift would do just that. It was yet another testament to his dedication to Seattle and to the importance of parks to our great and green city.

I first met Stim in 2002 when he called and asked for a meeting. At the time, we were raising money for the first manmade climbing rock in the nation and knowing that Stim was an avid climber, I hoped that he would be interested in that project. He was not. However, on that memorable day, I learned of his love of vibrant communities, parks, bringing people together, and great public spaces. We bonded immediately and he remained a close friend of mine and of the Parks Foundation.

Learning of Stim's recent death hit many in our community deeply. He was universally admired and had an inspirational spirit. He stewarded the vision for Harbor Steps, a prelude to our future waterfront. He spoke eloquently of the importance of great parks to great cities. Stim believed that parks helped build strong communities and he led by example.

Stim will be missed, but he has ensured that his legacy will live on through Seattle Parks Foundation.

This time next year, we'll be getting ready to open this entire 12-acre waterfront park!

Cheshiahud Loop on the Go!

BANDS OF GREEN



With a master plan, community support, and \$1.6 million from the City, the Cheshiahud Loop is off to a great start.

Work to create the safe and connected Cheshiahud Lake Union Loop is in full swing. Project partner, the City of Seattle, has already filled in two missing links identified during last year's Loop planning. In the fall, 500 feet of new mixed use path were built at the south end of the Fremont Bridge, and at Peace Park in the University District a sidewalk was created to make a safe connection between the Burke Gilman Trail and the University Bridge for pedestrians and cyclists. These projects exemplify the work that will take place all around Lake Union, filling in missing links and improving safety for all Loop users.

Seattle Parks Foundation is actively advocating for Cheshiahud Lake Union Loop projects and is working with City staff and community members to select the next improvements. We are also continuing to implement green space projects around Lake Union that will be connected by the Loop, including Lake Union Park, Waterway 18, habitat restoration south of the Fremont Bridge, and the Lake to Bay Trail.
